EEDC Operating Budget for 2019-2022 Realignment Due to Edmonton Global

Through 2017 and 2018 EEDC's Operating Budget has been realigned in two phases in light of the key roles and accountabilities framework drafted to clarify the roles of Edmonton Global, EEDC, and the City of Edmonton:

- Phase one: \$1.5M Government of Alberta funding of foreign direct investment, through the MASP program, redirected from EEDC to Edmonton Global effective January 1, 2018.
- Phase two: EEDC's 2018 tax levy decreased by \$668,000, and redirected to Edmonton Global, resulting in a commensurate ongoing reduction in EEDC budget for Enterprise Edmonton.

A portion of those redirected revenues were recouped by Enterprise Edmonton through contract to Edmonton Global to continue foreign direct investment work. Edmonton Global is not renewing the contract for January 1, 2019.
