## **Executive Summary**

The Edmonton Council on Early Learning and Care (ECELC) is presenting their 2020 Annual Report.

#### Report

EndPovertyEdmonton (EPE) was established in 2017 and identified affordable and quality child care as a "game-changer" alongside supplementary road map actions for eliminating poverty in Edmonton. On October 31, 2018, the Community and Public Services Committee received an information report that outlined steps to form a Terms of Reference for the Edmonton Council on Early Learning and Care (ECELC).

The ECELC annual report, Early Learning and Care in Edmonton: Progress in Building an Integrated System (Attachment 1) outlines the ECELC's achievements, activities and outcomes for 2020.

The ECELC continues to work closely with Administration to align future efforts and outcomes.

ECELC received \$100,000 per year tax levy funding in Fall 2016 through the City of Edmonton service packages, to support and respond to EndPovertyEdmonton five

year road map actions. This \$500,000 received from 2017-2021 was funded by tax levy and will conclude at the end of 2021.
