Background

Council Motion

At the April 19, 2017, Urban Planning Committee meeting, the following motions were passed:

- That Administration prepare a report in consultation with stakeholder agencies including EndPovertyEdmonton and Business Improvement Areas on the impact of clustering of Pawn Stores including the co-relation between the location of Pawn Stores and other businesses and their economic, social and land use impact on neighbourhoods and citizens.
- That Administration prepare draft amendments to Zoning Bylaw 12800 as generally outlined in Approach 1, 2 and 3 of the April 19, 2017, Sustainable Development report CR_4329.

Key Research Questions







Social:

- What influence do pawn stores have on individual social dynamics?
- How do pawn stores affect perceptions and crime in neighbourhoods?

Economic:

- What role do pawn stores play in the economic dynamics of individuals?
- How do pawn stores affect the economic health of neighbourhoods?

Land Use:

- What are the potential land use impacts?
- Are there any measurable impacts?

Academic Research Findings

Individual Social / Economic Dynamics:

- Provides needed financial service
- Education and financial literacy critical
- Regulations do not always benefit users

Neighbourhood Social / Economic Dynamics:


- Could not be determined that pawn stores cause crime
- Clustering can have positive impacts on businesses

Land Use Dynamics:

- Poor appearances can influence perceptions of crime and safety
- Advocacy of affluent neighbourhoods can force pawn stores into marginalized areas

Summary of Edmonton Specific Research






Crime

- Pawn stores not explanatory variable
- Located in neighbourhoods where crime rates also tend to be high


Summary of Edmonton Specific Research





Business Licence Analysis:

- Introduction of a pawn store may relate to an initial decrease in business licences within a block
- No clear relationship between pawn stores and surrounding business licences after the initial year




Land Use:

- Most of the pawn stores are located in the CB1 and CB2 zones
- The 2012 amendment may have encouraged new locations to open next to existing ones




Top 5 Responses






Regulatory History - Zoning Bylaw 12800





Prior to 2012 Amendment:

- Approved under <u>Minor Seconhand Stores</u> and <u>Major Secondhand Stores</u>
- Discretionary in 15 Zones
- 23 pawn stores existing in Edmonton



After 2012 Amendment:

- Approved under <u>Pawn Stores</u>
- Discretionary in 9 Zones
- 28 pawn stores existing in Edmonton

Photo Survey

- Large signs or awnings
- Window signage or visual display of goods
- Protective bars for security
