Heritage Fest picks up pieces, opens Sunday

The Heritage Festival will likely proceed on schedule despite Friday's tornado and massive damage to the site in Thursday's freak windstorm, say event organizers.

Only a few of the tents were damaged in Friday's storm, said Nena Timperley, chairman of the board of the Heritage Days Festival.

"They worked quite late last night . . . We'll see how it goes tomorrow." Timperley said.

Alan MacLean, president of the Edmonton Heritage Festival Association, said a "bit of a tornado" touched down Thursday in Hawrelak Park uprooting many of the large tents that had been set up in advance of Sunday's opening.

"It lifted four tents up and sent them four different ways," he said. "One ended up on top of a lamp post.

"They weren't just blown over, they were thrown across the road," he added. "One was hurled in the air and landed on top of another tent." dike Days Association provided tents to replace those that were damaged.

"We've always called ourselves the volunteer capital of the world, and today we're proving it," MacLean said from the Hawrelak park command centre. "We will open on schedule. We owe that to the groups."

The two-day festival, which features the cuisine and culture of 43 different ethnic groups, is scheduled to open at 10 a.m. Sunday although the official ceremony will not take place until noon.

During the festival, which is expected to draw as many as 350,000 people, organizers hope to beat the world's record for most people in a conga line.

The record of 8,559 was established by a British and Irish caravaning club in 1982.

A special citizenship court will be held in the park Monday afternoon.

Hawrelak Park has been closed to private vehicles and will remain that way until after the festival ends about 10 p.m. Monday. Edmonton Transit has estab-
