25-year Waste Strategy Background

- → 25-year Waste Strategy approved by Council in 2019
- → Extensive work was done to inform the strategy



- Two phases of public engagement (over 30,000 inputs)
- 8,000 home demonstration phase
- Supported by Program and Service Review, Waste Services Audit, Cost of Service Study and journey mapping
- Ongoing and comprehensive research and jurisdictional scanning to inform program and service transformation
- → Waste Strategy fundamentally transforms service delivery and impacts Council's Strategic Goal of Climate Resilience

25-year Waste Strategy

- → Waste Reduction Roadmap approved April 2021
- → Multi-unit Strategy presented June
 2021 and returning March 2022
 with additional considerations
- Edmonton Cart Rollout completed
 September 2021
- Single-use item strategy and bylaw coming early 2022
- Industrial, Commercial and
 Institutional strategy underway



Operating Budget Adjustments

- → Provide stable and consistent utility rates
 - Proposed 0% rate for 2022
 - Cart rates took effect October 1, 2021 and remain the same for 2022
- Service delivery transformations as part of the 25-year Waste Strategy
- → Asset optimization
- → Operational efficiencies






Capital Plan

- Focused prioritization and realignment of capital plan
- → \$161.5 million allocated to 16 capital profiles
- → Recosting of two capital profiles proposed:
 - ACETA profile adjustment for additional grant funding
 - Organics Processing Facilities actuals incurred will be written off and all remaining budget will be released

Shared Service Review Summary


- → Benchmarking study of municipally-owned utilities looked at cost as percentage of total expenditures, cost per service unit and reasonableness for receiving corporate or centralized services
- \rightarrow The following shared services were reviewed:
 - Information Technology
 - Human Resources
 - Financial Services
 - Communications

- Procurement
- → The costs across all categories appeared reasonable
