



Parkland Adequacy Assessment - Current Process

- → Need for additional neighbourhood open space must be clear
- → Assessment considers quantitative and qualitative measures
- Assessment includes broader open space network and adjacent neighbourhoods







Parkland Acquisition - Current Challenges

- Market timelines associated with the acquisition of privately owned properties
- → Public engagement may complicate negotiations or create a public expectation
- → Process requirements associated with Council Reports
- → Priorities are established as part of the four-year capital budget process

Parkland Acquisition - Process Improvements

- → Process improvements to consider both quantitative and qualitative assessment criteria
- Early and coordinated exploration of partnership opportunities
- → Applying a growth management lens to better prioritize open space acquisition in developed areas
- → Changes to timelines stipulated in the Joint Use Agreement
- → Periodic increase to acquisition budgets
- Establishment of an opportunistic land purchase composite profile
