
 25-year Waste Strategy: commitment to ban plastic bags and plastic straws





Need to Reduce Single-use Items

An estimated 450 million single-use items are disposed every year.





Approach

- → Edmonton's Plan to Reduce Single-use Items describes:
 - need for regulation
 - role of complementary voluntary programs
 - need for programs to support equity-seeking groups
 - importance of effective communication and outreach campaign



Recommended Bylaw Direction

Single-use Item	Recommended Direction
Shopping Bags	Ban on plastic shopping bagsFees on paper and new reusable shopping bags
Polystyrene Foam Serviceware	• Ban
Foodware Accessories	Available on requestProvide only the accessories requested
Single-use Drink Cups	 Require dine-in beverage orders at restaurants be served in reusable cups Require restaurants to accept customer cups for dine-in and takeout orders



Equity


- → Fees are far more effective than discounts or voluntary measures at driving behavior change
- → However, fees can disproportionately impact people who have limited or no capacity to plan for, prepare and clean reusable alternatives
 - E.g. people experiencing homelessness, low-wage earners, single parent households
- → Goal is to reduce single-use items and minimize unintended negative consequences
