- When affordable housing is presented to City Councillors, co-operative housing is included as an option for council to consider.
- To take advantage of the \$500 Million dollars set aside by the federal government for affordable, co-operative housing.



### The Goal of Co-operative Housing

- To provide low and moderate-income Edmontonians with modest, affordable housing;
- To encourage the social integration of families and individuals of different incomes families;
- To promote security of tenure for households unable to buy their own homes.

Leasing the land ensures the area will always be used for affordable housing.

The purpose of co-operative housing is <u>not</u> for financial gain.

Less municipal tax dollars required than other options

### Potential Action Items for City Council

Create an attractive environment for co-op housing through:

- Setting aside land
- Providing administrative assistance for start-up
- Reducing construction/permit red tape
- Financial assistance is always welcome but not required
- Co-investing into existing co-operative housing units

The Federal Government has invested the largest amount of money in several decades into co-operative housing
