# **Community Facility Partner Capital Grant**

2017 Grant Award Recommendations

## **Recommendation:**

That Community and Public Services Committee recommend to City Council:

That the 2017 Community Facility Partner Capital Grant Program recommendations, as outlined in Attachment 1 of the July 6, 2017, Citizen Services report CR\_4511, be approved.

# **Report Summary**

This report recommends the awarding of the 2017 Community Facility Partner Capital Grant.

# Report

## Background

The grant program provides support to organizations for the conservation and development of public use facilities that benefit the community and are of value to Edmontonians.

- Targeted sectors:
  - Arts and Heritage
  - Indigenous/Aboriginal
  - Multicultural
  - Recreation/Amateur Sport
  - Social Services
- Project types:
  - Project Planning
  - Life Cycle Replacement / Rehabilitation
  - Enhancements (expansion / redevelopment)
  - Build New (construction of a new facility)

The Community Facility Partner Capital Grant Program Policy (C562) was amended in March 2017. Changes included:

- an increase to the percentage of maximum funding (up to 33 percent of eligible expenses for the overall project and up to 50 percent of the planning costs to the end of concept phase)
- regional projects may be considered based on benefit to Edmontonians

Multi-year funding options for two or three years may be considered. The program currently has a base annual budget of \$4.75 million. For 2017, this amount has been increased with a carry forward from 2016 and the accrued amounts from two funding agreements, one expired and one terminated. As a result, the funding available to

award is \$7.5 million.

## 2017 Funding Recommendations

The recommendations fall into two categories:

- Allotment for a previously approved multi-year funded project.
- Grant funding for 2017 applicants.

A list of the recommendations is provided in Attachment 1.

In 2017, applications were received for 15 projects, of which 11 are recommended for funding. Nine of the projects are being recommended for single year funding, including four for planning work, and two are being recommended for multi-year funding. One project submitted is being recommended for single year funding for more design work and the organization will be encouraged to reapply in the future. The 2017 adjusted budget includes a carry-forward from 2016 in anticipation of the funding for 2017 (approved in 2015) for the Francis Winspear Centre for Music.

The recommended awards in 2017 total \$7.3 million as follows:

- \$3,000,000 for the Francis Winspear Centre for Music project
- \$4,278,463 for new projects submitted in 2017
