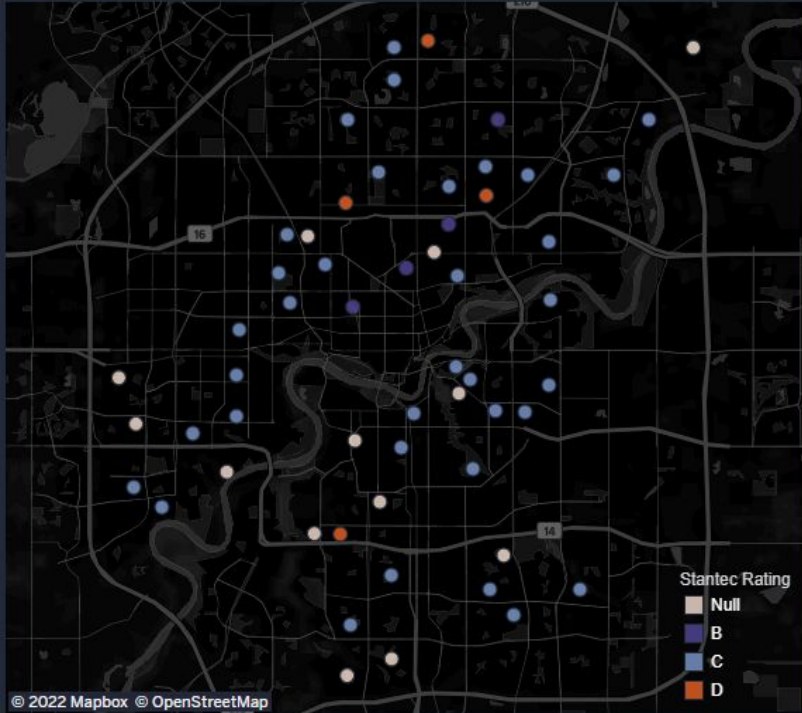

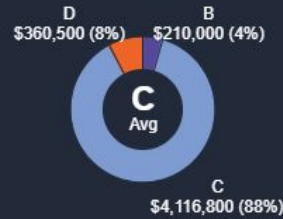

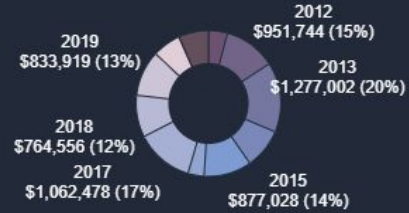
Stantec Cost Rating Comparison



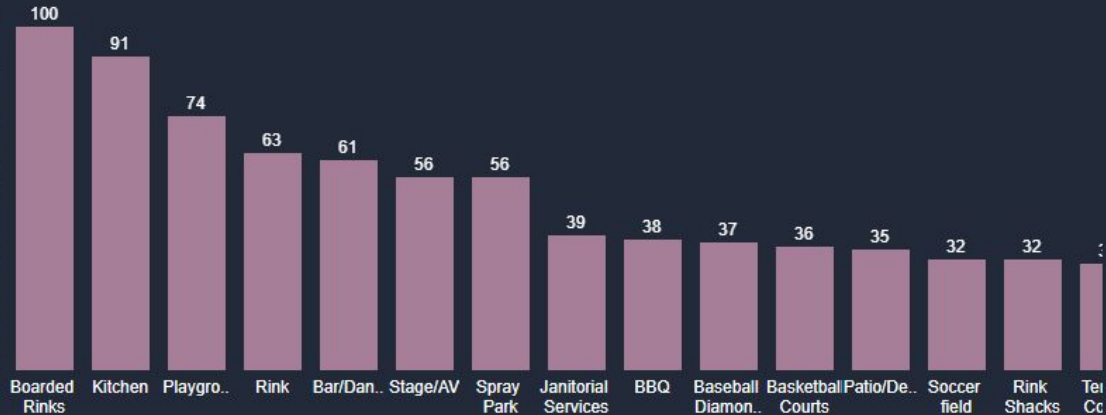

COMMUNITY LEAGUES: AN EDMONTON STORY



Community Leagues are a unique form of neighborhood organization that has been a part of Edmonton's history since the city's founding in 1904. They are a vital part of the city's social fabric and provide a wide range of services and support to their members and the wider community.

The principles that formed the first League under the name of Leagues were:

The organization is open to all residents in a defined geographical area, regardless of class, gender or ethnicity.

The League is a diverse non-partisan organization with no political or religious affiliations, where all residents are available and accessible to residents for social, recreational, community, hiking and cultural purposes.

The history and work of Community Leagues is further enriched on the pillars that support it: structure, diversity and community leadership. These are the three pillars that support the three aspects of our community: neighbourhood story.
