Complete Streets Design & Construction Standards

- When new assets are planned, or existing assets are scheduled for renewal,
 Administration seeks to achieve applicable modern standards.
- The Complete Streets Standards are intended to be applied in a context sensitive way, while forming the foundation for design decisions, including providing guidance on public realm infrastructure, including curb extensions, raised crossings, active mode infrastructure and many other elements.

Some Highlights Since the Standards Were Published

- As part of renewal and growth projects, the City has:
 - Constructed more than 520 curb extensions
 - 180 additional curb extensions for 2023 construction
 - Installed 80+ permanent raised crossings
 - 50 additional raised crossings planned for 2024 construction
- As part of the Safe Crossings and Street Lab program, the City has:
 - Installed 150 adaptable curb extensions, 2 two-stage crossings
 - 50 additional raised crossings and two-stage crossings in the 2023-2026 budget cycle
- Developers have constructed curb extensions and raised crossings in several infill and greenfield neighbourhoods.



Complete Streets Design & Construction Standards

Standards are being updated:

- The Complete Streets Design and Construction Standards are intended to be a living document, with regular updates to incorporate changes in best practice and their application in the Edmonton context.
- Require alignment with Councils approved strategies and policies while considering the overall impact to the cost of new homes for residents.
- Next update is planned to be published in September 2023, containing new guidance related to raised infrastructure such as continuous crossings.
- A more extensive update is also beginning, accompanied by engagement with city-building partners, such as utilities and the development industry.

In conjunction, Administration will also update the **Complete Streets Policy**.
