# The expenses of low-density

 Spread out populations require more services like police stations, fire stations, and libraries per capita<sup>1,2</sup>


- More extensive road networks, electrical grids, sewage and solid waste management, water supply, etc must be constructed and maintained<sup>1,2</sup>
  - Higher maintenance costs



# Unsustainable development

 Zoning exclusively for single family homes often results in budget deficits<sup>3,4</sup>

- Higher density often leads to higher productivity and higher municipal profits<sup>5</sup>
  - More revenue streams can lower the burden placed on taxes



### Edmonton

- In Edmonton, making new neighborhoods under current zoning rules results in neighborhoods with higher maintenance costs than tax revenue.<sup>6</sup>
  - Each new neighborhood reduces city wealth and increases tax burdens
