
# D. Shaner Presentation to Council Oct 16, 2023 on proposed zoning bylaw changes

### Photo 1

My house in Inglewood is on the left and the beige house to the south of mine has been sold to a developer. This photo was taken on October 4 at 4 pm. Note the small shadow of the neighboring house on my house.



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## Photo 2

Photo taken October 10 at 10:00 am. Notice that

- 1) My house is not centrally placed on the lot, but is 5' from the south property line
- 2) I have a garden in those 5' that relies on the sun that I get on the south side of my house
- 3) I have a 7' living room window that faces south

Both my house and the house to the south are single-storey homes, so they go well together with neither being overshadowed or overpowered by the other.

# Photo taken October 5 at 1:00 pm

This shows what will happen to my home if a multi-storey residence is built to the south. The white house on the right has a large shadow from the beige home next to it. My house will be like the white one—the south side will always be in its neighbor's shadow.

This is the approximate view that I will have from my living room window if a two or three-storey house is allowed to the south of my home. My sunlight, view of the sky, and privacy will be gone.
