Current Encampment Status - February 7, 2024

- 311 calls received in January 2024 635
 - Average of 1,435 calls/month in 2023
 - December 2023 had 1,049 calls
 - Compared to January 2023 with 206 complaints
- 33 encampments waiting for assessment (compared to 221 at the beginning of the year)
- 8 scheduled for closure & cleaning (occupied)
- 133 waiting for cleaning (vacant)



Shelters and Indigenous-Led Shelters - Update

- The Indigenous-led Shelter and the Indigenous-led Transitional Space EOI is being advanced through four projects:
 - 1. NiGiNan Housing Ventures Stabilization Space
 - Enoch Cree Nation project
 - 3. A multi-agency collaborative Indigenous-led Permanent Shelter Design
 - 4. Indigenous-led Transitional Space
- Indigenous-Led Shelter, two in progress:
 - NiGiNan Housing Ventures Stabilization Space (fully operational)
 - Enoch Cree Nation project at Coliseum Inn (phased opening, 80 spaces operational, total will be 100)
- Indigenous-led Transitional Space:
 - Consultants report on the transitional space with CoE/Indigenous stakeholders for feedback now
 - Report coming later in 2024

Emergency Operations Centre Updates

- Infrastructure maintenance and repairs
 - \$1.3M in unanticipated costs in 2023 resulting from major incident damage to critical infrastructure from encampments.
 - EOC coordinated response with city Infrastructure
 Maintenance: expedited closure, repairs with
 preventative reoccupation and mitigation strategies.
- Animal Care Support
 - 6 dogs and 5 cats



Support and Navigation Centre Outcomes Overview (Feb 8)

- 231 All-time visitors to centre
- 2. 121 Individuals connected to shelter
- 3. 65 Referrals to housing
- 4. 92 Individuals received basic health care service (from AHS and Radius Health)
- 5. 117 Individuals received Identification Services
- 6. 91 Individuals received Employment and Financial Services Support.
- 7. 80 Individuals had transportation arranged



Ongoing Connection to Community Leaders

- Two meetings (so far) with social services leaders
- Learnings include:
 - Inter-agency communication and processes
 - Unmet needs in specific populations (eg. youth)
 - Diversity of intake processes
- Next meeting will be to discuss lessons learned from the Navigation and Support Centre to inform future work (including extreme weather responses)
