PROJECT OVERVIEW

Need for West Shelter

- Growth in the number of people experiencing houselessness in Edmonton requires additional shelter spaces
- There is a significant need for shelter services in the west end of Edmonton
- There is need to decentralize social services in Edmonton

Site Selection

This specific site was chosen for several reasons:

- 1. Size and layout of building
- 2. Ability to offer a range of services to help people exit houselessness more than just shelter services
- Allows for separate daytime space from sleeping space and enhanced storage

Services Offered

Summary of services:

- 1. Up to 120 spaces available on a 24/7 basis, including low mobility and couples' spaces
- 2. Food and hygiene services
- 3. Housing workers
- 4. Health services
- 5. ID & income support services

Shelter Model

Following evidence-based best practices, the shelter will be housing-focused:

- Including a Diversion team who will provide immediate assistance to everyone using shelter services
- Collaborative housing plans will be developed, ensuring community members have access to a range of housing service options that suit their needs

Shelter Best-Practices

Efforts have been made to meet CoE shelter best practices in the following ways:

- Housing-focused approach to service delivery
- 24/7 services, including a separate eating area and day space
- High level of accessibility and inclusion, including spaces for couples and barrier-free and gender-neutral washroom and showers
- Range of embedded support services and connections to other services (including transportation)
- Semi-private spaces & access to a range of storage options

Program Data

April 2023 to March 2024:

- Emergency Shelters services provided to over 8900 unique users
- Diversion & Housing housed 830 people
- Health Services 1643 unique clients served; 6063 clinic visits
- ID Services provided services to 341 people from Oct 2023 to Mar
 2024
- 24/7 Crisis Diversion Teams responded to 11,045 events

Mitigating Efforts

Many efforts have been made to minimize community disruption, including:

- 24/7 transportation to and from the site
- 24/7 programming and services, including a separate day space and a concealed designated smoking area
- Embedded social and health supports
- A range of storage options, including bicycle storage, amnesty totes, regular storage totes and self-serve lockers
- Support from the 24/7 Crisis Diversion Team
