





The William Buster Residence was constructed in 1912 as part of the growing Garneau neighbourhood. The house is typical of homes built in Garneau during an economic and residential boom in the pre-war period. This housing boom was felt by many Southside neighbourhoods and Garneau grew particularly quickly during this period. Many businesses and residents were drawn to Garneau and other neighbourhoods south of the North Saskatchewan River because of the newly opened High Level Bridge, which provided more convenient access to the northside of the river and the continuing development of the University of Alberta.

Architecturally, the William Buster Residence is a good example of a Craftsman influenced design. This style was favoured by Edmonton's middle class in the early twentieth century for its modest but durable and well-designed homes. Typical of the Craftsman style, the house has a gable roof and includes many decorative elements, like the fish scale shingles on the wide flared eaves. Decorative details are likewise found in the corner, frieze and fascia boards as well as in the diamond patterned mullions above the double hung sash windows. The William Buster Residence has a covered verandah with low-pitched hipped roof and tapered square columns with capitals supported on brick piers. The lower storey of the two-and-a-half-storey residence is clad in wooden clapboard and transitions to shingles on the upper storeys.

The William Buster Residence is significant for its association with the early development of Garneau and its Craftsman influenced design.
