

Accessibility

1 in 4 Edmontonians identify as having a disability (2022 Statistics)

- Disabilities can be visible, invisible, temporary or episodic
- → Barriers limits independence and choice
- → Accessibility enables participation by reducing barriers





Timeline Two policies on 199 accessibility **Review of existing** 2017 policies initiated 2019 Policy C602 approved 202 **First Corporate Updated Policy**; **Accessibility Plan** 202 **Next Corporate** published

Accessibility Plan

Policy C602

Commitment to equitable access and participation

- → Acknowledging the impact of barriers
- → Making City services inclusive
- → Proactive vs. reactive approach
- → Lack of provincial legislation
- → Aligning with best practices



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Updated Policy

Edmonton's commitment to be an accessible city

Key updates:

- → Simpler language
- → Clearer commitments
- → New guiding principles
- → Updated definitions





Community Insight

Understanding the needs of Edmontonians with disabilities

- → 2024 engagement
 - 43% agreed accessibility is improving
- → 2025 engagement
 - Broad support for the policy updates





Implementation

Incremental changes with a phased-in approach

Updated Procedure

- → Guides and resources
- → 2025-2029 Corporate Accessibility Plan
 - Accessibility actions
 - Annual progress reports



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Impact
