


OUR WORK IN 2024

- Reporting on significant progress implementing Connections & Exchanges, Edmonton's 10-year arts and heritage plan
- Celebrating EHC's 15th anniversary in 2024 while advancing the vision of heritage as a living part of daily life
- Working to amplify diverse voices, connect communities, and integrate heritage into city planning





ANNUAL REPORT 2024

KEY PROGRAMS

- Heritage Community Investment Program (HCIP) funded 26 diverse projects (nearly\$700,000 distributed) and supported 10 heritage organizations through operational funding
- Funding Indigenous Resurgence Program (FIRE) distributed \$190,452 to 20 Indigenous cultural resurgence projects including cultural gatherings
- Edmonton City as Museum Project commissioned 24 labour history stories, with over 107,000 visits to our ECAMP website.





COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

- Expanded Commonwealth Walkway with 46 additional Indigenous stories using nehiyaw (Cree) methodology
- Iskwehew and Ihwehew Kamik ceremony brought together 50 women and queer Indigenous Peoples
- Equity progress measurable and meaningful:
 - 60% of HCIP project funding directed to equity-deserving communities
 - Indigenous programming expanded with strengthened cultural protocols
 - 80% of Community Heritage Activation Sponsorship recipients from equity-deserving groups





STRATEGIC PRIORITIES FOR 2025

- Strengthening heritage leaders' civic planning involvement through formal government relations strategy
- Enhancing economic resilience for heritage practitioners via pay scale initiatives and innovative funding
- Building organizational capacity and expanding storytelling initiatives through neighborhood programming and new Heritage Pulse survey

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

OUR WORK IN 2024

- **Record Growth:** FIRE applications up 79%, ECAMP reached 1,140+ Edmontonians, HCIP distributed \$700K to 26 projects
- Equity Focus: 60% of HCIP funding to equity-deserving communities, 80% of Community Heritage Activation Spnsorship recipients from equity-denied groups
- Indigenous Investment: \$190K distributed to 20 cultural resurgence projects including medicine parfleche, moose hide camps, and deaf cultural gathering
- Labour History Stories: 24 commissioned stories highlighting invisible contributions like Métis ironworkers and AGA founding
- Community Programming: YEG Trivia, youth workshops, walking tours (251 participants), pop-ups reaching 890+ people
- Strategic Partnerships: \$36.5K in sponsorships, K-Days Heritage Hall, Commonwealth Walkway digital stories
- Sector Advocacy: Unprecedented community response during budget pressures demonstrated heritage's community value





Total: \$2,423,006

REVENUE - WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM:

City of Edmonton - \$2,359,402

Enables program delivery and support for communitydriven heritage work, as well as EHC's administrative core capacity to deliver programs and services.


Other Grants - \$38,234

Grants from Government of Canada and the Province of Alberta to support specific initiatives within the larger program delivery.

Membership, Donations, Event Revenue - \$25,370

Memberships, donations and miscellaeneous revenue for specific program-delivery.





Total: \$2,465,997

EXPENSES - WHERE THE MONEY GOES:

Programs - \$1,823,884 Expenditures on program delivery including grants, honoraria and staffing costs. Core Administrative Support - \$599,174 Non-program specific operating costs and administrative staffing support.

Equipment & infrastructure - \$42,939

Amounts incurred for equipment related to both program-specific and administrative staff.
