# Draft: City of Edmonton Response to Community Sustainability Task Force Recommendations and Actions

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#### Elevate: The Report of the Community Sustainability Task Force – Implementation Plan

#### INTRODUCTION

Many Edmonton communities, especially mature neighborhoods are challenged with keeping their communities livable, lively and vibrant when confronted with change. Many of Edmonton's mature communities are experiencing the cycle of change that over time moves from a young family demographic to a neighborhood of very few children and numerous grandparents. These changes in population may slowly lead to a loss of vibrancy and community 'wholeness'.

The city recognizes that communities are the building blocks for a quality of life for its citizens and is aware that a key building block in healthy communities is local schools and life long learning. In collaboration with the province, school boards, parents, and community groups, the Community Sustainability Task Force was formed in 2011 to bring together a group of citizens to look for and recommend a course of action (both short-term and long-term) supporting and enhancing the viability of mature neighbourhoods and neighbourhood institutions that are community based, break down boundaries, share resources and build effective community partnerships.

Achieving sustainability in Edmonton's mature neighbourhoods is a complex challenge that requires new solutions and strategies. The ELEVATE report is the resulting work of the Community Sustainability Task Force which has identified nine specific recommendations to create new solutions for Edmonton's neighbourhoods already in distress or at risk of distress. The ELEVATE plan is anchored in a vision statement:

Edmonton is an engaged City in which informed citizens work together to create strong and sustainable neighbourhoods and communities. Our community will embrace diversity, where we can provide a physical and social environment where we can live, learn, work and play, and will meet the needs of current and future Edmontonians through their entire lifetime.

The overarching vision frames the report and guides the manner in which the action items will be embarked upon in future. The recommendations and action items may also apply equally well to Edmonton's newer and newest neighbourhoods, given that they are our mature neighbourhoods of the future.

The implementation of the ELEVATE recommendations is only just the beginning of a journey that will require leadership from all four levels of government – the City, school boards and Alberta Education, the Province and Federal Government – to work together to develop and formalize a new urban agenda that will empower communities to make their neighbourhood the best it can be. The following pages describe actions required to make headway on each of the recommendations.
