Existing Situation

- Weekday Transit Service:
 - Begins between 5:00 a.m. 6:30 a.m.
 - Ends as late as 1:00 a.m. 1:30 a.m.
- Weekend Transit Service:
 - Begins between 5:30 a.m. 9 a.m.
 - Ends between 8 p.m. 1 a.m.
- Ridership levels taper off significantly after 10:00 p.m.
 Many late night trips have been cancelled due to low ridership (<5 passengers).

Concerns and Issues

- Lack of transit service for shift workers late at night (11 p.m. to 1 a.m.) in outlying industrial, business and commercial areas.
- Lack of transit service for early morning shifts (before 7 a.m.)
- Lack of transit service for hospitality industry workers and patrons to travel home after closing hours of licensed establishments.
- Lack of service into neighbourhoods during late night hours.

Other Major Cities

- Ottawa: 2 night routes. Both routes travel predominantly on the Transitway. Major destinations are downtown, the airport, and rail stations.
- **Toronto**: 24 routes. Serves primary corridors and follows the subway lines. Service to the airport, hospitals, entertainment district, post secondary institutions and downtown. Suburbs are served within a 15 minute walking distance to homes. Most of the service operates at 30-minute frequency.
- Montreal: 23 lines. Service to downtown, suburbs, airport, bus terminals, entertainment district and hospitals. 45-minute service.
- Vancouver: 12 routes. Service downtown, suburbs, transit exchanges, postsecondary institutions and the airport. Three routes emulate the SkyTrain and Canada Lines.
- Calgary, Winnepeg, Halifax: No night transit network. Service ends around 1 a.m.

Network Options Considered

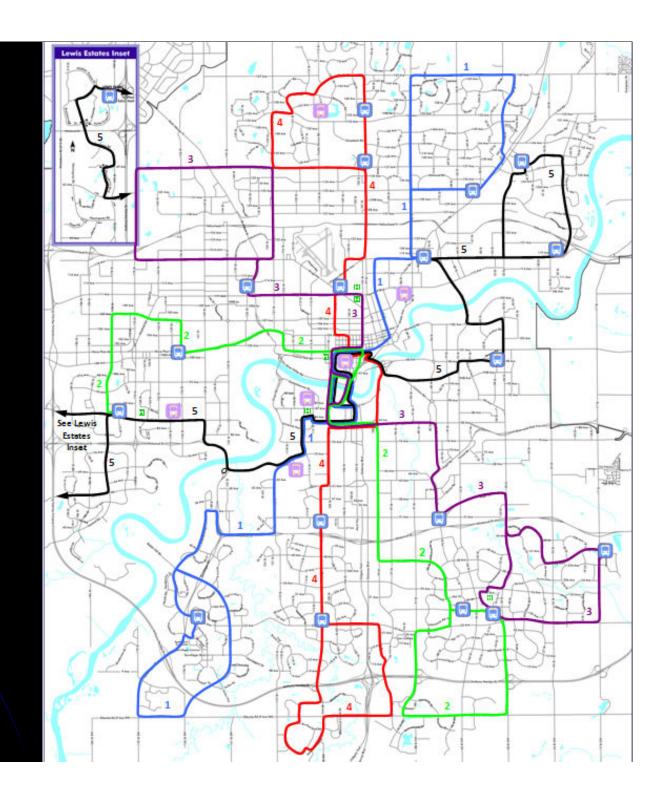
- 3 network options considered

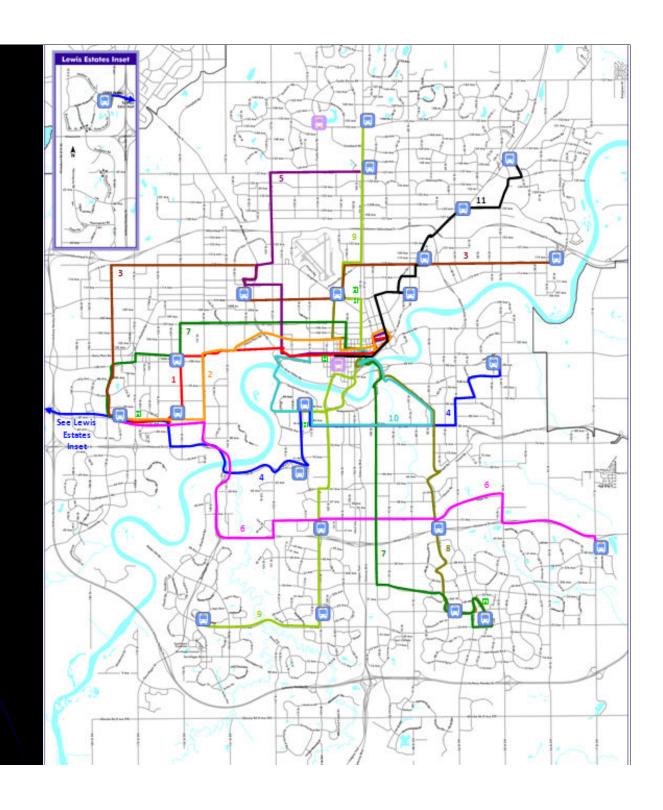
Option 2

52.5 FTEs

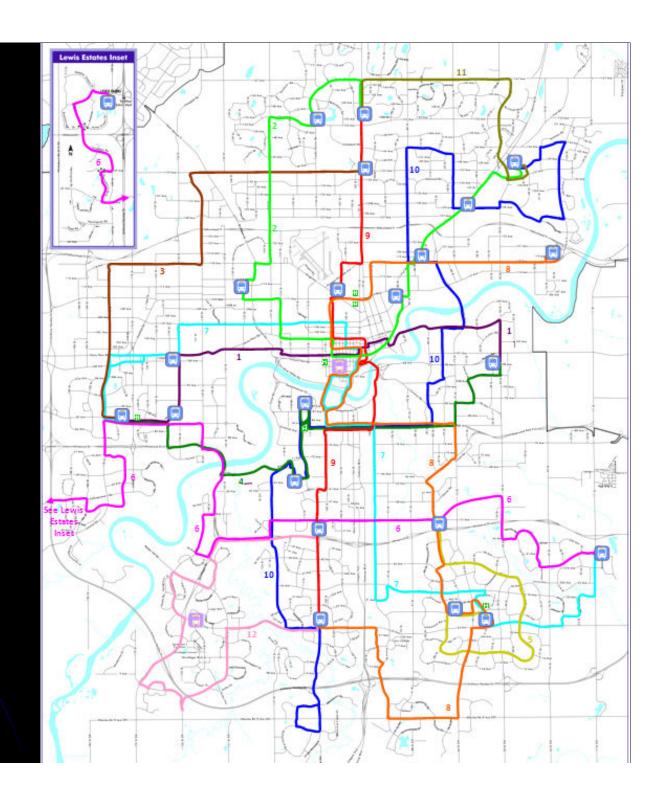


Option 3 Combination Network
