



Centre for Arts & Music

Launched in early 2011, The Centre for Arts & Music (CAM) is a division of The Rock and Roll Society of Edmonton. Focusing on youth at risk in Edmonton, our aim is to instill confidence and provide the life skills these young people need to succeed in today's world.



Instructor Jeff Kittlitz teaches a student in our pilot program about the finer side of keyboard layout. This young lady went on to perform live at a fundraising event and will continue in the program as a mentor.


Studies* confirm the importance of keeping youth constructively engaged between 3 - 7 pm, as this is when many are left alone and can be negatively influenced. In Edmonton, youth deemed 'at risk' of delinquency are priority students for the CAM program. They typically come from impoverished backgrounds, unstable homes, and are often in the care of a social services agency.

CAM provides these children with a safe environment where they can constructively spend time to learn new skills. Through the power of music, they receive instruction on how to write lyrics, compose music, play instruments, record CDs, produce video and perform live. Services are offered during critical after school hours, and includes individualized instruction to accommodate those with learning difficulties.


*Juvenile Offenders and Victims: 1997 Update on Violence; Family-Based Programs for Preventing and Reducing Juvenile Crime (2008) A recent pilot consisting of 22 under-privileged and at-risk youth yielded impressive results. In addition to demonstrating measurably improved behavior and focus, the children also experienced a sense of accomplishment leading to improved self-esteem and confidence; qualities that will support them into adulthood. Graduation from the 15-week pilot program was held in June, 2011, and several students have since performed live in venues and on TV.

More importantly, these children learned to express themselves constructively through music and song writing - a powerful form of therapy. In the process, CAM believes that engaging children in positive musical instruction during critical after-school hours will help reduce the likeliness of participating in criminal activity. In this sense, CAM provides a safe and encouraging environment, and fosters positive attitudes and growth to improve our city and communities.

Over 400 children are now on a waiting list and the Centre is in discussion with inner city schools and social agencies to identify those who can benefit most from CAM. To continue this much-needed program, the centre must expand and move operations to the next level.



The Centre for Arts & Music recently secured space at a new location in Edmonton's inner city at the historic Hull Block. Work is currently underway to renovate this space into six fully functional and sound-proof recording studios.



Funding to Support Vision & Growth

To continue this critical community program, The Centre for Arts & Music must raise \$260K to complete renovations at the Hull Block, set-up and operate for next twelve months.

The Centre is requesting financial support from The City of Edmonton for a one-time contribution of \$165,000, or a multi-year commitment totaling \$165,000 (Year 1: \$50,000, Year 2: \$55,000, and Year 3: \$60,000).



Most musical instruments at CAM have been donated by local musicians and citizens. Picking up donations, managing inventory and completing repairs /maintenance is performed largely by dedicated volunteers.



Work is currently underway to renovate the Centre's new space into six fully functional and sound-proof recording studios. Each student will produce a CD recording of the song they wrote and composed music to.

All funds are utilized exclusively to develop and initiate the Centre for Arts & Music. All financial statements are available for viewing and are audited by Pennock, Acheson, Nielson, Devany.



Centre for Arts & Music Curriculum

Over 400 children kids are now on a waiting list and the Centre is in negotiations with St. Alphonse School, Catholic Social Services and Yellowhead Correctional Centre to identify 220 youth who could benefit most from the CAM program in the upcoming 2011/2012 school year.

Building on the success of our pilot project, instructors have modeled the curriculum using the same approach. This consists of an individual assessment to determine skill level and areas of interest, and then embarking on the music and song writing process prior to being prepared for the studio.

As was the case during the pilot, CAM will continue to recruit professionals such as experienced educators involved with youth at risk, child youth workers, and accredited musicians with teaching backgrounds.

St. Alphonse (Inner City School)

This consist of a 10-week course where instructors will come on location between the hours of 3:30 – 7:30 pm for two days each week to provide students with a three hour session. Each cycle will support 20 students, who upon assessment will be grouped into teams of five. Following the song writing and musical instruction portion of the course, students will have two three-hour field trips to CAM where they will complete the recording and video production portion of the program.



The majority of children participating in the CAM program are encouraged to form small bands (a la Camp Rock Star style). In the process, they acquire self-esteem, confidence along with respect for themselves and others.



As part of the CAM program, all participants start by learning to write, perform and record simple exercise songs. As their skills progress, so too does the complexity of the music they work with. In addition to spending time with our full time staff, all students also have the opportunity to spend time with special guests and mentors. Performances in front of each other, parents and friends help to build their confidence along with professional photos and videos CAM produces.

Yellowhead Correctional School

This program focuses exclusively on one-on-one time with five students per ten-week cycle. CAM instructors visit the school twice each week to provide individualized mentoring. Students will also receive three 4-hour field trips sessions to CAM accompanied by a guardian.

As is the case with all programs, students are assessed and then guided through the processes of writing their own song and music in line with their ability and interest. They are prepared to spend time in the studio prior to recording their music and video performances. Students also get the opportunity to earn credits, perform live and work with experienced musicians and mentors. Work is currently underway to sound proof rooms at Yellowhead and provide needed equipment.

Catholic Social Services

Approximately 30 children will go through the program for each 10-week cycle. Students will be taught exclusively at CAM following the same basic curriculum outlined for the other programs. All students are accompanied by their case worker or guardian.



Measures of Success

The CAM project launched and completed a 15-week pilot project with the support of Catholic Social Services (CSS) in April 2011. The project included 22 children ranging from the age of 10 to 17.

These children selected an instrument to learn, wrote a song, recorded their song and assisted in the engineering and production of their music. Some formed bands to work together on their songs.

Collectively the group produced a compilation CD featuring all their songs entitled "Give Us A Chance." The group performed live at several functions including the 50th anniversary celebration of Catholic Social Services, opening ceremonies of the South Common Farmers Market and at a graduation ceremony held in their honour. Some also appeared on local television and continue to captivate audiences when they perform.

Each student goes through an individual assessment to help determine their skill level and area of interest. At the conclusion of the program, all students will go through an evaluation individually, with their parent or guardian and school teachers to formally measure areas of improvement.



Learning to write their own song and compose music to it, helped all members of 'The DC Homies' to feel proud of their accomplishments and all showed measureable improvement in their behavior and ability to focus.

The pilot project was deemed a success. The best measureable indicator was the change in behaviour in those children involved in the pilot project.

Social workers, care givers and guardians all recognized a marked improvement in the behaviour and attitudes of these children during and after the program. The students often asked to borrow instruments so they could practice on their own. They showed initiative in learning and the desire to learn new skills.

These positive behaviours developed a as result of pride in their new accomplishments. The caregivers advised that these improved behaviours also carried into their home environment, and that additional practice at home occupied time that previously was unproductive and even challenging at times.

In addition to this improved behaviour, we were also able to measure improvement in the children's ability to play a musical instrument. Most had no previous experience or formal instruction. At the conclusion of CAM, all of the students significantly improved their skills.


The Rock and Roll Society of Edmonton
