

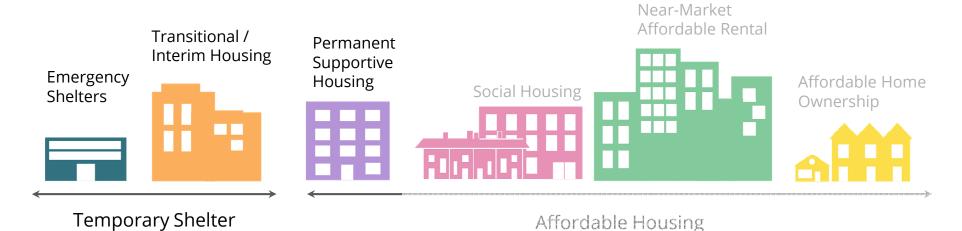

The Challenge

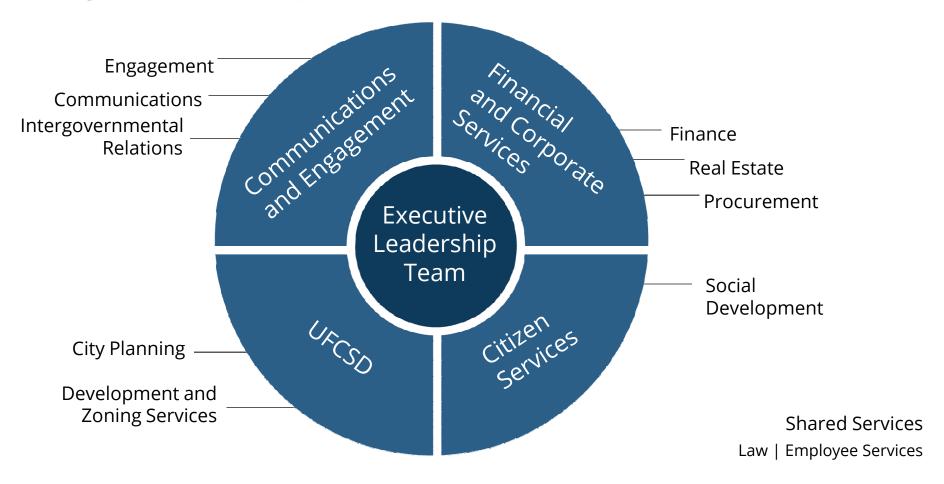




- 2,000 people who are chronically homeless living in Edmonton
- 600 units of permanent supportive housing are needed by 2022
- 300 additional units of permanent supportive housing are needed by 2024



Integrated Transformational Team



Guiding Principles



- 1. A different relationship with risk
- 2. Say "yes" first
- 3. Policy as an enabler of change
- 4. Departments lead but don't 'own' the issue
- 5. Fast and adaptable
- 6. Not business as usual

Action Plan



Scope: Expedite process to develop 600 units of permanent supportive housing in the next four years

- 1. Select, Plan and Prepare 15-20 sites for PSH
- 2. Key Deliverables
 - Land Acquisition Plan
 - Intergovernmental Advocacy Strategy
 - Zoning Bylaw Changes
 - Expedited Planning Approvals/Permitting Process
 - Affordable Housing Public Info Campaign
- 3. Fast-tracking of Modular Permanent Supportive Housing Units



Future Council Decisions

Required Approvals

- Below market lease or sales
- Zoning bylaw changes

Potential Approvals

- Affordable housing policy updates
- Blanket rezonings
- Expedited Planning Approvals/Permitting Process
- Level of public engagement
- Modular housing contract approval
- Delegated power of authority
- Land acquisitions (above market or \$5 million)



Fast Tracking - Rules of Engagement

- Level of Approvals
- Improved Communication with Council
- Shared Accountability

- June 11 Urban Planning Committee (verbal update)
 - Zoning bylaw changes
 - Two phased approach

Packaged with Missing Middle Changes

Expedited development approvals





Zoning Bylaw Changes

- Two phased approach
 - Phase 1: immediately delete existing barriers to permanent supportive housing from the Zoning Bylaw, initiate 'Missing Middle'
 - Phase 2: more robust look at new framework such as a new 'assisted living' use
- Phase 1 changes to UPC July 9th (for info), then to City Council Public Hearing on July 15th and August 26 for missing middle.
