<b>Waterloo, ON</b>	BY-LAW NO. 09 –047- Section 20.1-20.4 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● No person shall feed wildlife in a manner that creates a nuisance.</li> <li>● No person shall place any food on any property in a manner that creates a nuisance.</li> <li>● No person shall feed a wild bird, unless they have the property owners permission, do not attract other animals or create a nuisance.</li> <li>● Exceptions for legal hunting and trapping activity</li> </ul>	Not more than \$5,000 fine pursuant to the Provincial Offences Act, R.S. O. 1990, c.P. 33, as amended.
<b>Mississauga, ON</b>	By-law No. 0098-04 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● No person shall intentionally feed wildlife or permit animal attractants</li> <li>● Exceptions for songbirds with conditions preventing attraction of other animals</li> <li>● Exceptions for legal hunting and trapping activity</li> <li>● Exceptions for feral cats within the City program</li> </ul>	Maximum Penalty of \$5000
<b>Squamish-Lillooet, BC</b>	BYLAW NO. 1551-2018 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● A person must not feed Wildlife or attract wildlife through food.</li> <li>● Property standards             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) remove fallen fruit</li> <li>(b) suspend bird feeders and remove fallen bird seed</li> <li>(c) properly maintain compost to not attract Wildlife</li> <li>(d) clean barbecue equipment of residual food</li> <li>(e) food storage must be inaccessible to Wildlife</li> <li>(f) properly store and manage wildlife attractants including bees, beehives, chickens, or attractive chemical products</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	Not exceeding two thousand dollars (\$2,000)
